June 30, 2026, 4:00 - 5:30 p.m. (UTC+2): "Reflecting on Future Skills for a Society Facing Multiple Crises - Liberation in Dystopia?" (Prof. Dr. Robert Pfützner, HSAP Berlin)

The concept of "future skills" emerges from a business-oriented and future-optimistic perspective that assumes the continuation of current economic growth and global market structures. In light of multiple crises—such as climate change, species extinction, and social inequality—this framework appears increasingly questionable. This presentation argues for rethinking the future, including engaging with potentially dystopian scenarios not only as decline but also as spaces of transformation and emancipation. Drawing on ideas by Bruno Latour and Peggy Piesche, it outlines alternative "future skills" centered on care, solidarity, and a critical awareness of power and discrimination.
